

When did we stop believing in mystery? I am reflecting on some innocent comments made by students in my 5^{th} grade First Communion class. Please do not think I am singling them out, because my question is larger than a few boys wondering, "Do we really drink the blood of Jesus?" My simple answer was, "Yes, of course, we do." Predictably, they giggled, and someone asked, "Does that mean we are cannibals?" I said, "That means we believe with our faith that Jesus wholly and really comes to us at Holy Communion, body and blood. We call this the real presence of Christ in the sacrament.

I am guessing many of my readers will side with the boys in my class. We rationalize the sacrament in such a way that we call it symbolic. I am not about to argue with anyone about this except to say, that while it looks like bread and wine and it is bread and wine, Jesus tells us it is his body given for us and his blood shed for us for the forgiveness of our sins. This is not something I can explain because it is in fact a mystery of our faith. Therefore, we believe Jesus is present for us in, with, and under the bread and wine, so that when we receive Holy Communion, we receive Jesus, as he promised.

Since we are on the subject of mystery, how about the miracles of the Bible? Let's start with the virgin birth of Jesus. Was it symbolic? How about Jesus healing lepers, restoring sight to blind men, casting out the demons of possessed people, walking on water, feeding 5,000 people with 5 loaves of bread and 2 fish, and raising a little girl and two adult males from the dead? Were these all symbolic too? Certainly, many have worked tirelessly to show that miracles are not mysteries revealed to us by God and the Lord Jesus, but rather everyday occurrences that can be explained by some natural cause.

This question of mystery is vitally important to us in the month ahead. Many of us will gather on Sunday, April 20 at 8:00 or 10:00am and proclaim, "Christ is risen! He is risen, indeed. Alleluia!" We will read a story from the Bible in which two angels will tell frightened women at the tomb of Jesus, "Why do you look the process of t for the living among the dead. He is not here; he has risen." Later in the story Jesus gathered with his troubled and doubting disciples and showed them his hands and feet, and if touching Jesus were still not enough for them, Jesus took some of their broiled fish and ate it in their presence.

Is the resurrection of Jesus symbolic too? Or is it one of those mysteries revealed to us by God that we cannot explain? The Apostle Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15, verses 14-15 that if Jesus is not raised than our faith is in vain, and we are misrepresenting God. He goes on to say in verse 19 that if Jesus has not been raised then we are all of people most to be pitied. Finally, in the very next verse Paul asserts, "But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead." After he says this, he does not attempt to make a rational explanation as to how this is true, except to proclaim, "Let me tell you a mystery."

The resurrection of Jesus is proclaimed because many of his closest followers were eyewitnesses. Paul writes that the risen Jesus appeared to Peter and all the disciples, more than 500 people at one time, and of course finally, to him. He was so convinced the resurrection of Jesus was real and not symbolic, that he was converted from someone who wanted to capture Christians dead or alive, to someone who became the greatest Christian missionary of all time, proclaiming the resurrection of Jesus from Jerusalem all the way to Greece. So, Paul believed in one the greatest mysteries of human history.

The resurrection of Jesus is the most precious mystery of Christian faith. As we face our own struggles, especially our own mortality, we look for the risen Christ to take us by the hand and lead us into this same mystery, that we too one day will be raised and enter into God's eternal home. As Mark 10:27 says, "all things are possible with God." In fact, I believe in all the mysteries of faith, the virgin birth of Jesus, his miracles, that we wholly receive Jesus' body and blood at Holy Communion, and that our Lord Jesus Christ is risen from the dead and is alongside you right now even as you are reading these words.

He is risen, indeed. Alleluia! You are in my prayers, House War

- Good Friday, April 18, 7pm "An Angel's Eye View"
 Crucifixion and death of Jesus, a service of diminishing light
- **Easter Sunday Sunrise Service**, April 20, 8:00am "*Morning Has Broken"*, a sunrise service led by ULC Youth
- **Easter Sunday Breakfast**, April 20, between 9-10:00am Omelets, sausage patty, muffin, fruit, juice, and coffee
- **Easter Festival Service**, April 20, 10:00am "*Traditional Easter Worship"*, brass, special music, and more

Let this be the year you experience Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Sunday, to get the full story of this critically important time of year for our faith tradition.



Feed My Starving Children

Our Greater Grand Forks MobilePack event is April 11-13. We are fundraising to pack meals for hungry children, and in April we pack these meals. This year we will pack over 400,000 meals. Our goal as a community is to raise around \$117,500 and so far, we have \$84,941.

So far at ULC, we are fundraising for this service event in these ways:

- Noisy Offerings at worship (January, February and March)
- ULC Endowment Fund awarded FMSC a \$2,000 grant



Remember every 29 cents pays for one meal for a hungry child in our world. A generous gift of \$30 pays for 103 meals, a gift of \$50 pays for 172 meals, and a gift of \$100 pays for 344 meals. What a wonderful way to serve hungry children!

Fun fact: Did you know that Feed My Starving Children has prepared 4,428,925,866 for hungry and starving children in our world.

We are now receiving applications for our fifth annual Paul and Bonnie Cox Scholarships. These scholarships are awarded to any person seeking any sort of post-secondary education. The scholarship committee will meet and hope to have an announcement to be made by June 1.

Financial News

Thank you for all your contributions to ULC so far in 2025. At the end of February our **General Fund Balance** was short, \$11,098. What happened was that income was down a lot in January, which is not unexpected after a fabulous month of December. In February our income and expenses were basically even, which is where we hope it will be.

We are still receiving **High Five Funds**, which means that some people are giving \$5 extra a week to give ULC at "high five" for the ministry we all do here together. It's a little cheesy, but also an effective way to raise a few extra dollars. Last year we raised an extra \$965. That's 193 high fives. Could we maybe do more this year? Of course we can!

We have received our **Blanche Evenson Gift** from the Community Foundation. Blanche's gift to us this year is \$5,477. Thank you, dear Blanche, for your yearly gift.
